Who is the BEST Committee?

- 3 School Committee members
- 1 representative selected by each Member Town
- 1 representative from Mohawk District Educators
- 1 representative from Hawlemont School District
- Key Administrators (Superintendent and Business Manager)

BEST Goals

To develop a plan that will help ensure the long-term viability of the District by:

- Enhancing educational programs to maximize college and career opportunities
- Controlling costs and assessments to member Towns
- Enhancing revenues

The only thing not on the table is the status quo

BEST Subcommittees

- Communications/Community Outreach
- Education
- **Facilities & Finance**
- Fundraising & Grants
- Transportation

Fundamental Propositions

- We are all in this together
- Reducing operating costs alone will not solve the problem
- **Nothing** can be implemented without the **unanimous** consent of all District Towns
- The status quo is unacceptable
- The **only** alternative: deep cuts to staff and programs


Background

Financial unsustainability

- Declining enrollment
- Declining enrollment ≠ cost savings
- Flat Chapter 70 state education aid


Declining Enrollment

Mohawk student enrollment has declined 45% since late 1990s



Declining Enrollment ≠ Cost Savings

Mohawk's steep enrollment decline has not produced cost savings




No Economies of Scale

Mohawk unable to capture cost savings with enrollment decline

- Example 1:
 - Single grade classroom
 - Enrollment declines from 20 to 15 (25%)
 - Requirement for 1.0 FTE classroom teacher same
- Example 2:
 - Building Costs (Principal/ Nurse/ Secretary/ Custodian/ Cafeteria)
- Example 3:
 - Transportation Costs (250 square miles largest geographic district in MA)

Flat Chapter 70 State Education Aid

Mohawk state education funding flat for more than a decade



2006-2007 Interim Planning Committee

- Recommendation
 - Combine four elementary schools into BSE building
- School Committee response
 - Proposed changes to regional agreement
 - Defeated by towns twice 6-2


2013-2015 Long Range Planning Committee


- Recommendation Examples
 - Share school buildings with towns
 - Alternative energy solutions
 - Full reimbursement of regional transportation
 - Advocate for rurality factor in Chapter 70 formula
 - Support drive for high-speed Internet access
- School Committee response
 - Implementing several of these recommendations
 - Additional cost savings required to achieve sustainability

Communications Sub-Committee: Key Focus

- Market the district's educational options to families & students in the 9-town region and beyond.
- Advertise what Mohawk offers for education
- Reach middle and high school families as they're researching educational options
- Reduce number of students leaving district to choice, private, and charter schools.

Communications Sub-Committee





Mohawk has no marketing budget; work was done by volunteers and some staff.
The Communications Sub-Committee solicited donations from local businesses to financed printing.

Communications Sub-Committee: Initiatives Taken

- Met with Mohawk co-principals, technology dept, and capstone advisor to brainstorm ways to involve students in telling Mohawk's success story
- Assessed ways to make the school website more inviting and user friendly to families researching the district.
- Communicated BEST progress with the staff and school community

BEST Recommendations: Overview

Phased approach allows for:

- Community involvement
- Thorough, thoughtful planning
- Systematic re-assessment of key variables

Unanimous Town Approval

- Regional Agreement Amendments needed for each phase
- Amendments require unanimous approval by all 8 District Towns

Phase 1 - Heath: Overview

- Heath Education Task Force Recommendation
 - Close Heath and tuition students to Hawlemont or Rowe
- Heath remains in the MTRSD/pays operating assessment
- MTRSD negotiates/pays tuition to Hawlemont/Rowe
- Heath 7-12 students attend Mohawk
- Savings: \$500,000+

Phase 1 – Heath: Next Steps

- Heath chooses a partner (Hawlemont or Rowe)
- MTRSD negotiates tuition
- DESE approval
- District Towns approval

Phase 2 – Expansion of MS to include 6th grade

- Sept 2018, Middle School expands to include 6th grade
- Enriched educational and extra-curricular activities
- Increase retention of students at the pivotal point between 6th and 7th grades
- Creates space in BSE and Sanderson for Phase 3

Phase 2 - MS Expansion: Process to Understanding

 Feedback session gathered input from all K-8 educators on all 4 possible configurations*

The 4 grade configurations evaluated were:

- Pre-K remains in all elementary schools
- Pre-K to grade 2 at all schools
- Grades 3-5 only at BSE
- Middle School expanded to include 6th grade
- Held 3 focus groups with parents to gather input and feedback*
- 69% of Middle Schools include 6th grade

Phase 2 - MS Expansion: Student Benefits

(Change = Opportunity)

- Increased enrichment opportunities: art, music, theatre, sports,
- More science and technology; much greater access to labs
- Increased academic opportunities: much greater choice of classes
- Students benefit from Mohawk's strong team-teaching model
- Easier transition to the MS model of single subject classrooms
- Larger peer group, more kids "like me" (social/emotional health)

Phase 2 - MS Expansion: Challenges

- Elementary schools lose their 6th grade "leaders"
- Honoring long-held, deeply meaningful traditions
- Mindful planning for students arriving in 7th grade
- Difference in age/maturity between Grade 6 and Grade 12

Phase 2 - MS Expansion: Challenges for Hawlemont/Rowe

Integration at 7th grade (staggered enrollment) requires mindful planning for students arriving in 7th grade.

- Specific planning/training with 6th grade teachers in both districts
- Aligning curriculum scope and sequence (e.g., planning grant for Mohawk MS to start an Ag program to dovetail with HAY program)
- Common events for 6th grade students in both districts (e.g., art shows/concerts/end-of-year party/dance) Other ideas?
- Learning from our neighboring districts: In-depth discussions with Gill/ Montague on their process

Phase 2 - MS Expansion: Conclusion

MS expansion is the key to reducing costs in Phase 3

- Thoughtful and deliberate planning is essential to a MS expansion
- Recommend completing this transition in September 2018 rather than September 2017 to give us the time necessary
- There is a clear need for continuing dialog with those most affected throughout the transition process

Phase 3 - Two School Consolidation

Collaborate with member towns to redistrict and consolidate elementary students (Pre-K to Grade 5) into two schools, creating two new learning communities at the current Buckland Shelburne Elementary and Sanderson Academy sites.

Phase 3 – School Consolidation: Overview

- Heath School closes
- Sept 2018, Mohawk MS is expanded to include 6th-grade
- Sept 2019, Colrain Central School closes and is returned to the town for repurposing
- Sept 2019, All Grades Pre-K to 5 attend BSE and Sanderson

Phase 3 - School Consolidation: Benefits

- Cost savings: (\$600,000 + \$500,000 Heath = \$1.1 million)
- More resources and opportunities for teachers/school staff to collaborate
- Social and academic benefits to students: wider social network, greater access to special programs and resources (technology, extracurricular activities, etc.)

Phase 3 – School Consolidation: Challenges

- Colrain loses its local elementary school
- Additional transition for several grades of students moved in middle of elementary years
- Potential capacity constraints at BSE might require geographic redistribution

Phase 3 - School Consolidation

New Learning Communities

The way that we frame these changes will make an enormous impact on the educational experiences of all the children in our district.

A Centralized Campus ??

Based on community feedback, BEST revised its recommendations

 Consider a centralized campus ONLY after Phases 1-3 are completed and ONLY IF additional consolidation is essential for sustainability

Ongoing & Next Steps: District Vision

- Re-thinking operational structure = opportunity to re-think the educational experience
- How do we want to teach and learn?
- Connect students to learning, learning to community
- A *shared* community endeavor: students, parents, educators, taxpayers
